

UWM Youth Caregiver Opioid Use Disorder Project



<u>Purpose</u>

- We are interested in learning about the experiences of youth caregivers, children/youth aged 10 - 18 who help provide care for a person with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD).
- We would like to connect with organizations that work with youth caregivers for family members with OUD to discuss potential community-university partnerships and collaborative opportunities that would investigate the following research question, How OUD has affected young people and their role as caregivers?
- The team hopes to work with the community to conduct research that would ultimately lead to future interventions and resources for this population.

UWM Youth Caregiver Opioid Use Disorder Project



Potential short-, medium- and long-term outcomes

- (short-term outcome) Establish an ongoing Community Advisory Board consisting of experts and those who have been directly impacted by this issue to help inform the development of this study.
- (medium-term outcome) Obtain funding to conduct a study consisting of a series of interviews with youth caregivers who care for family members with OUD, family members with OUD, and experts who work regularly with this population.
- (long-term outcome) Develop interventions and provide resources on youth caregiving for family members with OUD.

WAUKESHA COUNTY HEROIN TASK FORCE MAKING STRIDES IN THE FIGHT AGAINST SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER IN 2023

(Maukesha, WI) – The Waukesha County Heroin Task Force (HTF) is groud to announce significant progress in its ongoing battle against substance use disorder, fostering collective impact and hope throughout the community in 2023. These efforts are highlighted by a substantial decrease in overdose deaths. According to recent data, drug overdose deaths in Waukesha County decreased by more than 19% from 2021 to 2022.

"We owe our progress to the dedication and collaboration of our community partners," HTF Cochair, and Executive Director of Elevate, Mary Simon said. "Together, we are working tirelessly to make Waukesha County a healthier place to live and work. These achievements underscore our shared commitment to addressing substance use disorder and fostering a supportive environment for al."

Throughout the year, the HTF engaged with more than 235 community partners, holding four community partner meetings to address critical issues surrounding substance use disorder. These gatherings facilitated discussions on current research regarding pregnant women impacted by opioid use disorder, insights on drug trends from the Waukesha County Drug Task Force, and conversations on addiction stdman and its reduction in Waukesha County.

Key Accomplishments in 2023:

- Engaged in discussions with law enforcement leaders about person-first language and effective stigma reduction strategies.
- Created a Community Resource Guide to provide a one stop shop for people to find resources in Waykesha County.
- Collaborated with Waukesha County leadership to support the implementation of
- medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) in the county jail.
- Provided data literacy training for community partners so they can better understand and act on local and national data trends.
- Began work to address the need for stable housing for people with substance use disorder.

Collaborative Approaches and Partnerships

- Creating partnerships to connect people to the services they need.
- Utilizing opioid settlement funding creatively and effectively.
- Exploring the ability to share data between organizations.
- Tying together the resources of many individual agencies involved with the HTF.
- "Grow our table" and use coalitions to address strategies and tactics collectively.
- Collaborative strategies to fund work related to addressing substance use disorders (SUDs).
- Conscious expansion of efforts to tackle larger problems.

Community Engagement & Increase Awareness

- Speak with the community to understand their needs better, possibly through surveys.
- More success stories to inspire and encourage individuals.
- Increase awareness and education for older adults on opioids.
- Power of storytelling in recovery to leverage partnerships.
- Continuing to work on communication and resource awareness.
- Extending invitations to businesses not normally involved in substance use work.

Resources & Support Services

- Providing resources for mothers-to-be who are struggling with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD).
- Funding for all three FDA medications for Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD).
- Peer-run recovery center where people needing support can drop in.
- Ensuring access to treatment without needing to "qualify" or be "sick enough".
- Increasing knowledge on accessing resources.
- Providing spaces where individuals with SUDs can share without shame.
- Awareness and collaboration around drug-endangered children.

Advocacy & Policy Change

- Collaborative efforts to advocate for policy changes.
- Aligning recommendations from the Office of National Drug Control Policy (OFR) to advocate and change policy.
- Establishing a court for county-involved families to provide additional support.




Heroin Task Force Data Personalities by Type

Utilizing the following features can help you gain additional insights from this data.


- . "Drop Down Menus" filter results across an entire page and can be used in any combination.
